Lesson Plan Magic Tree House Fact Tracker: Rain Forests

Amazon Rain Forest Brochures

As students learn additional facts in the Fact Tracker Rain Forests, they will become rain forest experts who are eager to share their knowledge with others! Allow them to make an Amazon Rain Forest brochure and tell them that their task is to persuade their readers to visit the rain forest by revealing many interesting facts. They will be recording facts learned in the book, but will also be able to use their creativity and express personal choices. Ask them to think of a visual aid to bring to school to support their writing to make their project more interesting. There are many “gifts” of the Amazon Rain Forest that your students will discover that they may have in their homes. Many are mentioned in the Fact Tracker Rain Forests (examples: bananas, chocolate, spices) but they may also choose to conduct further research to find out more. Some students may have stuffed animals or bean-bag type animals from the rainforest to share. Allow your students the freedom to use their imaginations as they take readers on a “tour” of the rain forest!

MATERIALS NEEDED:

- Classroom copies of the Fact Tracker, Rain Forests
- Amazon Rain Forest Brochure Form (included) for each child
- Amazon Rain Forest Brochure (included) copied on 11x17 copy paper for each child
- Colored pencils
- Each child should be encouraged to bring a rain forest “gift” from home to support their brochure and for display purposes.

DIRECTIONS:

1. Read the Fact Tracker Rain Forests with your class.
2. Print out the Amazon Rain Forest Brochure form and allow students to answer the questions as they read. This will help them gather information to use as they make their brochures. Tell students that they may also refer back to the book and research rain forests on the internet for more information.

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3. Print out the Amazon Rain Forest Brochure on 11x17 copy paper for each student. Instruct them to use their brochure forms and the books to help them create their brochures. Ask them to draw in the appropriate sections the layers of the rain forest using the fact Tracker as a guide and their favorite rain forest animal. When they list gifts from the rain forest ask them to list something that they might bring to school to accompany their brochures. (Give examples and suggestions.)
4. When all written work is completed, give instructions on how to fold the brochure:
 - First, fold the brochure in half on the dark horizontal line.
 - Next, fold the left side on the lines under the cover sheet that says “Amazon Rain Forest Brochure”.
 - Lastly, fold the right side under the cover sheet on the lines so that only the cover is showing.
5. Allow children to share their brochures with classmates and display them in the classroom along with an item from the rain forest brought from home.
